LARGE FUNERAL HELD SUNDAY OVER BODY OF MALORY ROBINSON

Malory Robinson who died suddenly Wednesday night, January 18 and whose death was reported in these columns last week, was funeralized the past Sunday afternoon from the family residence, 325 North A street. Being a member of the Knights of Pythias, three branches—the lodge, uniform rank and cadet guards—the procession extended a great length with this order alone, and added thereto were the American Woodmen society and the large concourse of friends who had known the deceased through a lifetime.

Church services were held at Big Zion church where he was identified as a very regular member, and conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. J. Black, who delivered the eulogy, other pastors of the city assisting in other parts of the ceremony. A rare tribute was paid the deceased in song, eulogy and set of resolutions as well as the more visible crowded auditorium, and the banks of flowers in bunches and designs that surrounded the imposing bier.

Mr. Robinson was a retired U. S. Navy steward, spent thirty years as such and had traveled all the known seas and entered the important harbors of the world, and in a quiet and unassuming manner as was always his wont, he delighted to recall those days in converse with a friend or two. After his navy retirement he became employed by the Citizens and Peoples National Bank as janitor, and characteristic of his navy training, industrious and reliable, he soon became a very valuable employee of this institution, and among the entire bank personnel from President Reese down he was regarded with much consideration, and his sudden passing was heard with gloom and in pain. The bank employees attended the obsequies and among the handsome floral expressions were some from the bank that bespoke the esteem held for the dead associate server.

As a member of the Pythian organizations, Mr. Robinson was valiant and constant in performance of all his obligations, his particular office being that of master of finance of Myrtle lodge where all his accounts were always accurate, painstaking and trustworthy; he possessed the trust and confidence of every brother member. Whether at his work or in his fraternities, in his church, at his home, among his fellows, his absence excites the deepest sense of longing regret. After the very elaborate and impressive church service the long procession wended its way to St. John cemetery where the act of committal ended all that was mortal of Malory K. Robinson.

Died in Mobile—Burial Made in Pensacola

The death of John Elijah recently in Mobile, Ala., was sad news to many Pensacolians for here was once his home—his native home. He had lived in Mobile for twenty-five years. 
