GENERAL ELECTION COMMENT—QUALIFYING, ETC

The elections in 1936 are very important for the American citizen and especially so for the Negro. He should be prepared to vote and keep prepared. If he believes in the policies of the President he should cast a vote for his reelection; if he does not believe in his policies he should exercise his privilege and vote against him. Under any circumstances he should cast a ballot.

In the state election for governor and congressman, he should vote for his choice. In the county elections he may cast a vote for the various ones he would like to see in office. There will probably be a chance to vote again on the bond issue for schools. Good schools and school buildings are very important and the Negro's need to be improved. Unless the bond issue passes there will not be much chance for Negro schools. To vote in this election one must be a property owner and qualified.

There are about 700 home owners in Pensacola among the Negro population, not an imposing array. Of that number not quite 100 were qualified to vote in the last election. If Negroes want better schools he must be prepared to go to the polls and cast his vote for the bond issue. Pay your poll tax and become registered.

The United States jury for the coming term of court does not contain one Negro. This state of affairs is almost unprecedented. There are not many Negroes on the qualified list. It is up to the Negroes to get busy and not have this condition become chronic. Let the Negro quit throat-cutting and get his forces together.

Boy Scout Institute For Training Leaders To Be Held At Atlanta Univ. Summer School

Atlanta, Ga.—A Boy Scout institute for the further development of scoutmasters, commissioners, and other leaders in the Boy Scout program will be initiated by Atlanta University in connection with its summer school, it was announced this week. The institute will open July 9, and will last through Sunday, closing with a public camp fire vesper service Sunday night, July 12.

The institute will be under the personal supervision of Stanley A. Harris, national director of interracial activities of the Boy Scouts of America, who will be assisted by W. A. Dobson, regional executive from the Atlanta office and Weaver Marr, executive of Atlanta.

The institute will develop three courses. First, "The Introduction of Scouting;" second, a course in "Troop Camping," and the third, prepared especially for men who supervise Boy Scout troops, and will enable the scouters to be really helpful to the scouts under their supervision and to promote the ideals of scouting among the boys.

"It is most fitting that a great university should develop this type of training program," Mr. Harris said. "Columbia University in New York, and Peabody College at Nashville, many years ago, led off in this field of education. Scouting is a program of activities most interesting to all boys. Every boy joining the organization takes the following pledge, the Scout Oath:

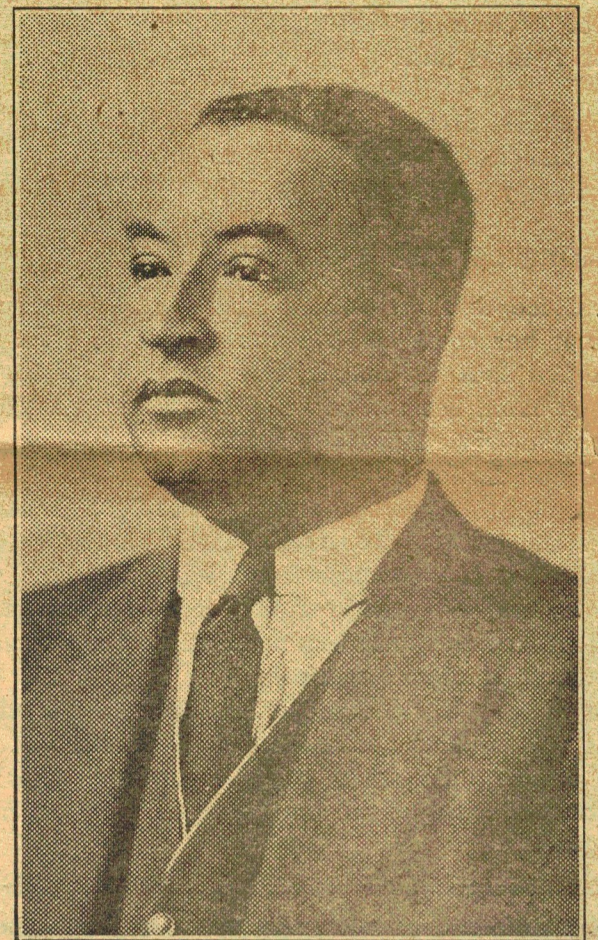
"On my honor I will do my best—

1. To do my duty to God and my country, and to obey the Scout Law;
2. To help other people at all times;
3. To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight."

"It is remarkable how well Scouts live up to the oath," said Mr. Harris, "and it is my opinion that every public school should sponsor a Boy Scout troop in cooperation with its Parent-Teacher associations."

"Not only is Scouting splendidly adapted to the school, but it is of equal to the church. Indeed, nineteen of the largest religious denominations in America have endorsed the Scout program for use in their church schools. They find that Scouting helps the church to hold its own boys. It helps the church to attract the non-church going boys and most important, perhaps, it helps the church train its boys for leadership tomorrow."

Durham, N. C. — A. N. P. — Since the Democratic party controls affairs of the state, most of the qualified Negro voters in North Carolina are Democrats and there is little possibility of any colored delegates to the Republican National convention, the Associated Negro Press learned this week.

Leaders of the state, now in the midst of a registration drive, believe that Negro participation in Democratic politics will insure more official consideration and better race relations. Many have qualified as voters and the registration is slowly increasing.

President J. W. Asbury's Convention Address To The Baptist Young Peoples Convention

Mr. President, Officers, Delegates and Visiting Friends of the Rising Star B. Y. P. U. Convention:
Again with guidance from our Gracious Father, we are blessed with the wonderful opportunity of another face to face meeting.

I am delighted to look into the faces of so many young people. I wish more of them were present. As I have often said the work of the B. Y. P. U. is to train Christians. Since the Sunday school teaches the Bible it is partly responsible for the number of Christians there are to be trained. If all teachers of the Bible were whole hearted Christians there would be more training to be done.

The question so often comes before us: "What will become of our youth?" In my feeble opinion I believe if more attention is paid to the formation of character the outlook for the youth would be much greater.

Character is the result of many forces or influences. It is a matter of growth, process of slow development. It cannot be formed overnight. It belongs to a lifetime. It is generally developed unconsciously but manifests itself in every thought, word or deed. Without a good character life is not worth living. Good character is worth more than all other riches combined. When it is lost then all is gone. It cannot be purchased with money or redeemed with gold.

Character is formed by heredity. The sins of the fathers are visited upon the children unto the third and fourth generations. A person's character begins to form a hundred years before he is born. We inherit tendencies and these influence our lives for good or evil. The influence of heredity is great, but environment is still greater.

Our surroundings, associations and relationships have much to do in the shaping of character. These even overcome the forces of heredity.

It is a certain fact we cannot choose our parents. We can not determine the influences of heredity, but we can, to a large extent, control the environments in which we live. We can help make the world we live in a better world. We can change our living conditions. We can control some of the forces around us, and the results should be better men and women.

Character is permanent possession. It is the only thing we can take with us to the other side. The time comes when we must give up our homes, books, friends and work. We have brought nothing into this world with us and we shall take nothing away. Character, however, goes with us. Life was given for that purpose.

B. Y. P. U. workers and leaders, strive to teach the young Christian that the gift of God is eternal life and to enjoy that gift one must have a Christlike character. A Christlike character will help us walk straight the narrow path. It will keep the young and old Christians away from card

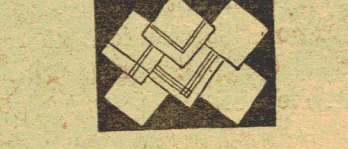

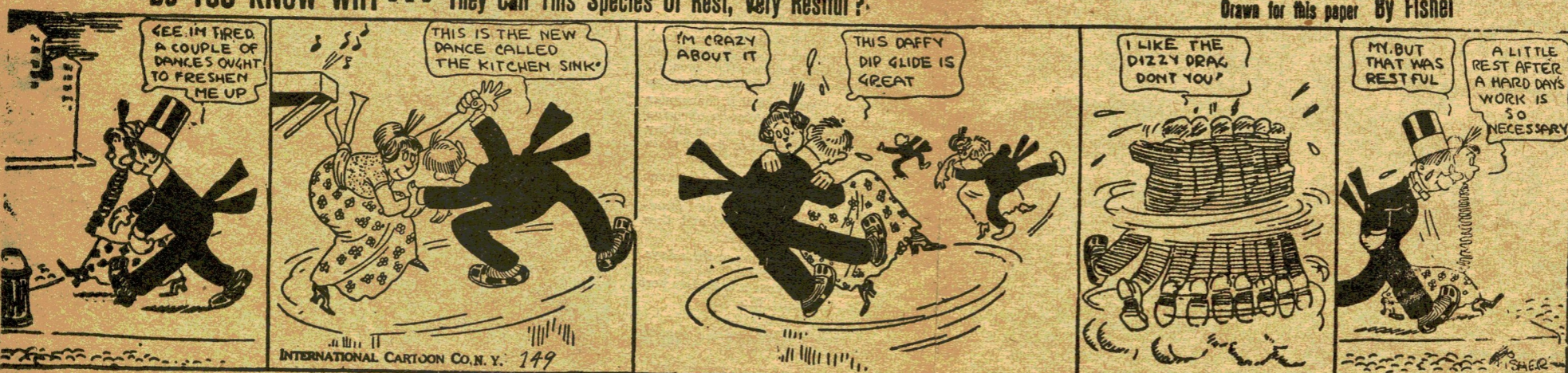
