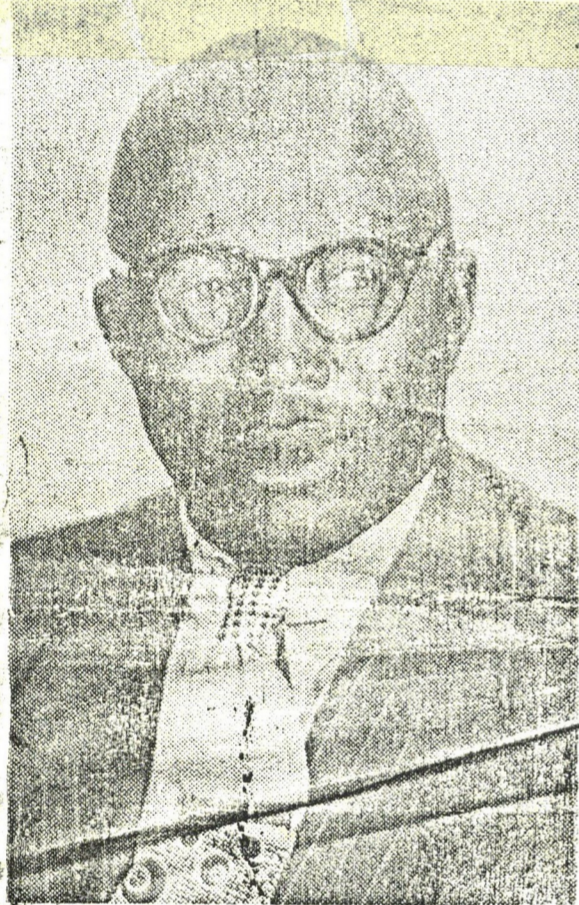

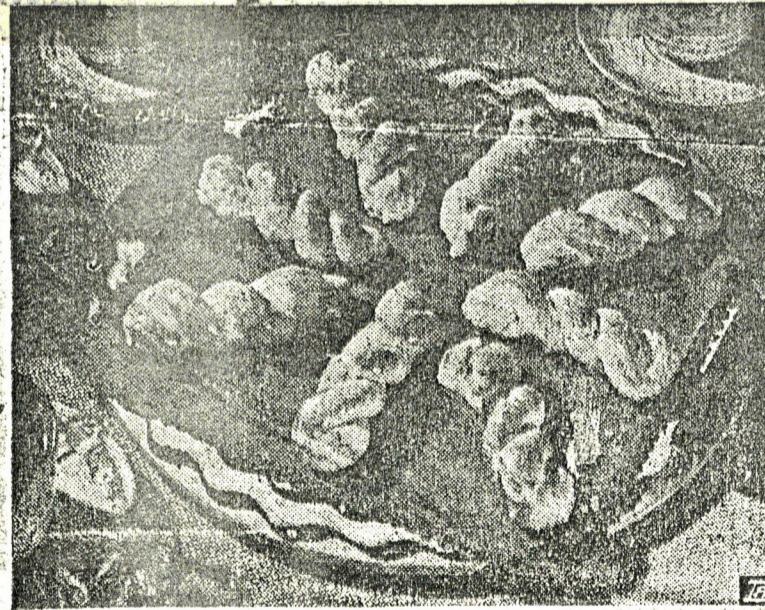

**Pennywise Frosted Twists**



Would you guess that you can make these tempting Twists for just a cent-and-a-half apiece? Serve them for family meals and coffee hour refreshments.

For a new twist to your "sweets" assortment, make glazed Twists from a kneaded sweet yeast dough. These rolls are a take-off on the popular cruller, but are baked instead of being deep-fat fried.

Use recipe suggested here, or your own favorite sweet yeast roll recipe. If you wish, make one coffee cake and use the rest of the dough to shape Twists. No special equipment is needed. Just fold 8-inch strips of dough in half and roll so the strips twist. If you prefer, cut dough into four-inch strips and twist together by twos. Pinch ends of dough together so the Twists won't uncurl during baking.

When cool glaze with confectioners' sugar icing. Make this by combining three tablespoons milk and one cup confectioners' sugar. Good nutrition goes hand in hand with economy when you serve these tempting sweet rolls. The enriched flour used in making breads of all kinds provides essential B-vitamins and food iron needed for vitality and good health.

**TWISTS**

- 2 cakes yeast, compressed or dry
- 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind (if desired)
- 5 cups sifted enriched flour (about)
- Confectioners' Sugar Icing

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour. Mix well. Add eggs and lemon rind. Beat well. Add softened yeast. Mix well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board, and knead until satiny. Place in greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled.

When light, punch down. Pinch off portions of dough and roll under hand to 1/2 inch thickness and 8 inches in length. Fold and roll back on itself, twisting ends around each other. Pinch ends together to seal. Let rise until doubled. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Makes about 3 dozen twists.

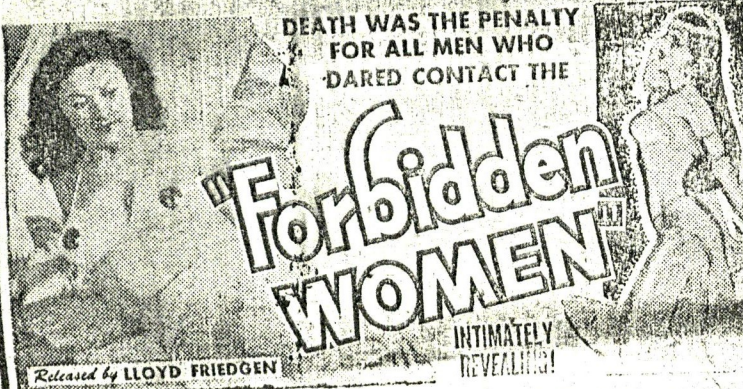

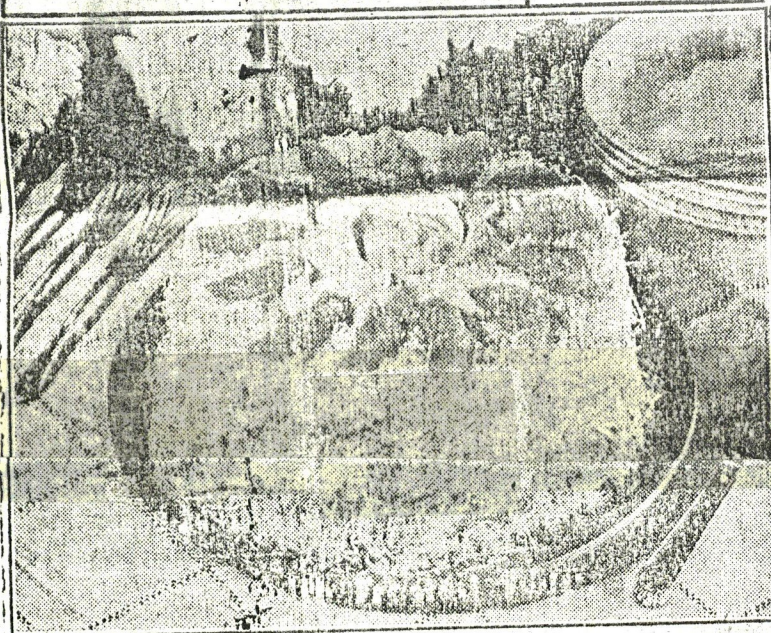

### Sugny as Spring CAKE OF THE MONTH



By BETTY BARCLAY

Here is a tempter to woo the dieters at your table right off their good-resolution perches! Oh, well, it's Spring! The occasion calls for occasional deviations from routine, and here is a dessert that is certainly off the beaten track. Could anything be more festive looking than this Spring Glory Cake? A sunburst of luscious orange segments, a cloud of snowy white coconut, creamy butter frosting—all topping two moist and delicious cake layers! What a treat!

#### Spring Glory Cake

- 2 1/2 cups sifted self-rising cake flour
- 2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs, unbeaten
- \*Milk (see below for amount)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- \*With butter, margarine, or lard, use 1 cup milk. With vegetable or any other shortening, use 1 cup plus 2 tablespoons milk.
- Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating very thoroughly after each. Then add flour mixture alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla and blend.
- Turn into two deep 9-inch layer pans which have been lined on bot-

oms with paper, then greased. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 25 to 30 minutes, or until done. Frost with Orange Butter Frosting.

#### Orange Butter Frosting

- 1 tablespoon grated orange rind
- 1/4 cup orange juice (about)
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 egg yolk, unbeaten
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 cups sifted confectioners' sugar.
- Add orange and lemon rind to fruit juices and let stand 10 minutes; strain if desired. Cream butter; add egg yolk and salt and mix well. Add part of sugar gradually, blending after each addition. Add remaining sugar, alternately with fruit juices until of right consistency to spread. Heat after each addition until smooth. Makes enough frosting to cover tops and sides of two 9-inch layers. Sprinkle sides of cake generously with shredded coconut and garnish top with orange segments.

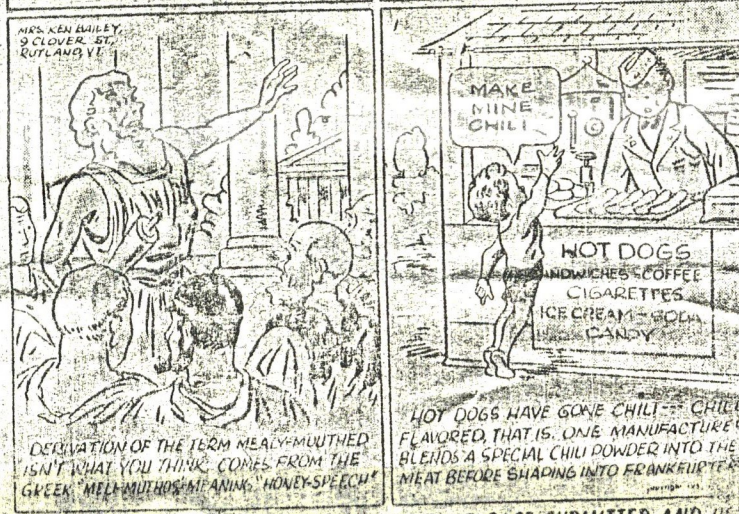

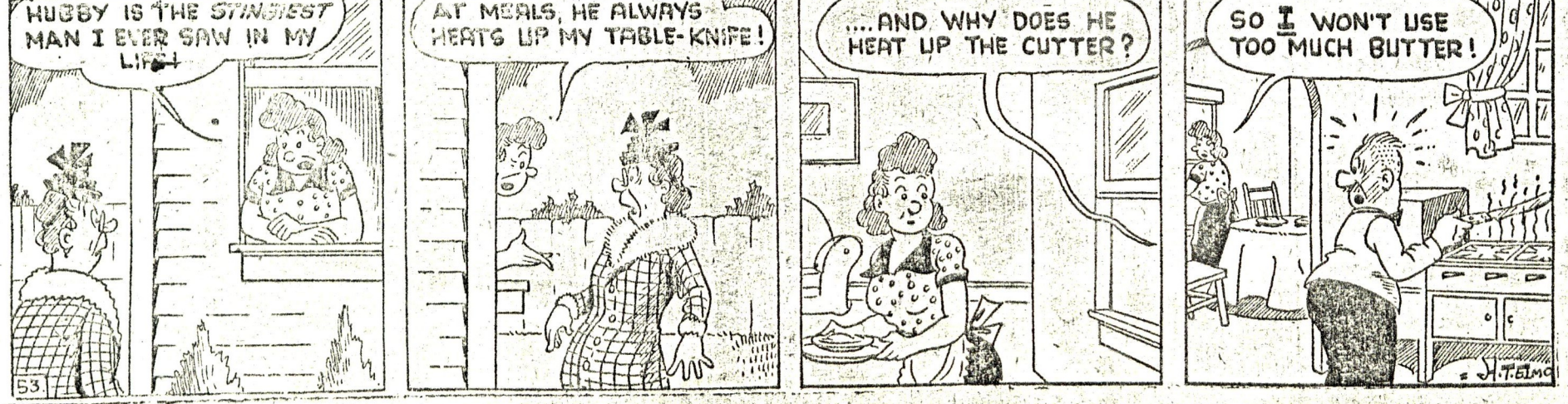

### Legalized Gambling Is Issue at Polls

NEW YORK—With church groups and clergymen leading opposition campaigns, proposals to legalize virtually all forms of gambling will appear on the November general election ballot in Arizona and California, while a proposal for state-operated lotteries will be placed before Massachusetts voters, a survey discloses.

Because similar proposals are expected to be advanced revenue-raising measures in many other states next year, when 44 state legislatures will convene in regular sessions, the outcome of the forthcoming referendums will attract attention far beyond the borders of the states involved.

An initiative measure to be voted upon, Arizona would legalize virtually all types of gambling under the jurisdiction and control of the state. The proposal would allow operation of casinos, slot machines, book-making establishments and card rooms at an annual license fee of 8 per cent of gross revenues of the gambling establishments. It would provide an initial appropriation of \$100,000 to set up a department of state control of gambling to be headed by a superintendent.

### Holy Year Service Attracts 40,000

NEW YORK—An estimated 40,000 persons took part in a Holy Year service held in the Polo Grounds here under the auspices of the Holy Name Societies of New York. Taking part in the rites were Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York; Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, Secretary of the Sacred Congregation for the Oriental Church; five bishops and scores of monsignors and priests.

The ceremonies, at which participants pledged respect for civil and spiritual authority and prayed for the conversion of Communists, simulated a pilgrimage to Rome. Spotlights on the night-darkened arena were five tableaux symbolizing shrines in various countries which Holy Year pilgrims have visited on their way to or from Rome.

### Clergyman Takes Challenge

LANCASTER, Pa.—A Unitarian clergyman here accepted the challenge of the United Rubber Workers (CIO) Local 295 to appear before the executive committee of the union to "prove" Communistic charges he made against its president in a radio broadcast. But the union's local head, Paul S. Shaub, refused to permit the clergyman to bring reporters and the president of Lancaster CIO.

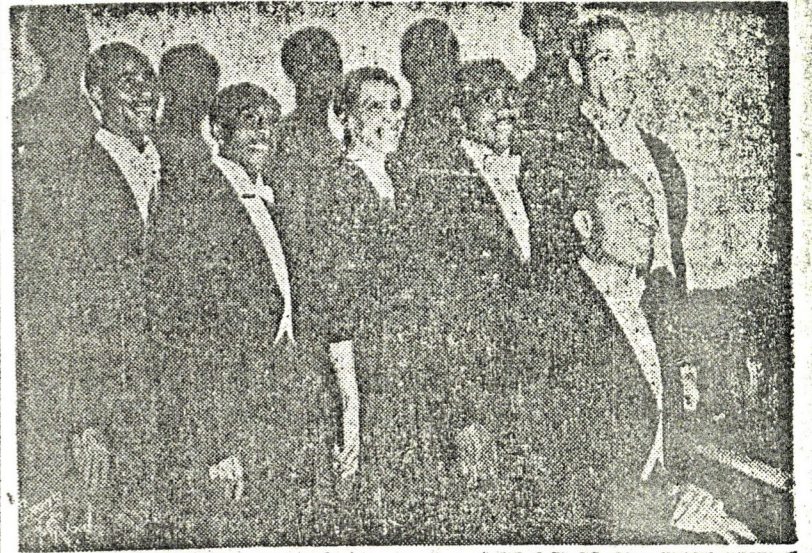
