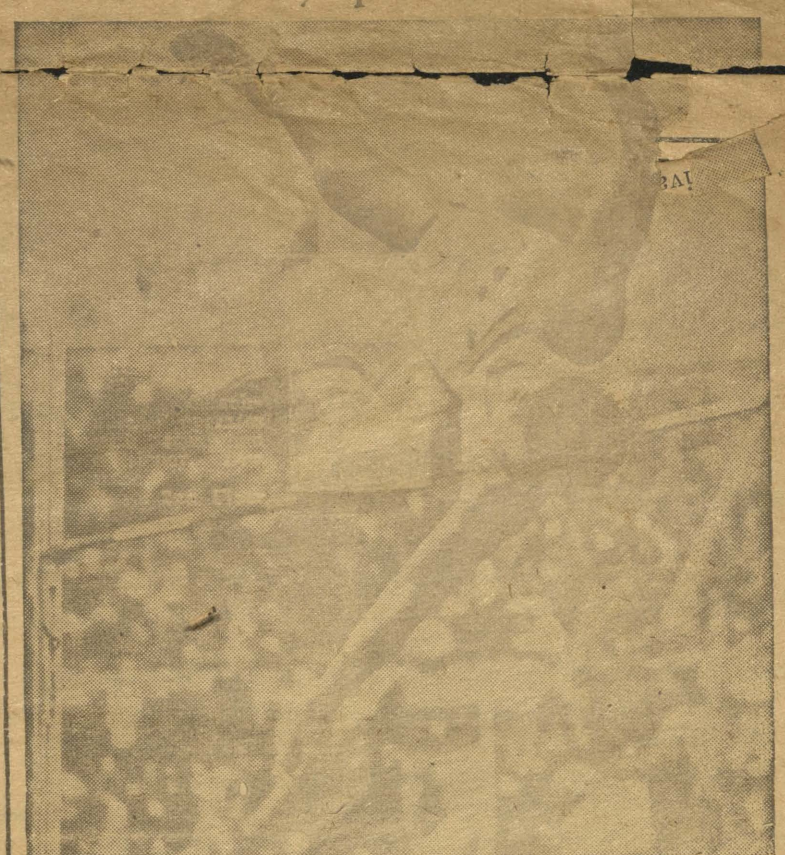

BEWARE OF FOOD SPOILAGE DURING SUMMER WEATHER

Fungus, mold, insects and dry rot are always waiting to destroy your food supply stored in cupboards and bins, just as they do on a farm, the American Fat Salvage Committee points out.

Food experts and technicians urge women to be constantly vigilant, lest deterioration robs us of precious food.

Take inventory, inspect and clean out cupboards, refrigerators, cabinets, baskets where food supplies are kept, suggest home economists. Cereal, prunes and raisins easily become weevily; onions begin to sprout; bread begins to mold; fat gets rancid.

Air out cupboards, inventory supplies, plan menus to use onions, cereals and dried fruit before they begin to deteriorate. During the warm months, store bread in the refrigerator. Keep your fat salvage can in the refrigerator, on the cellar steps or in some other cool spot, and when it is filled, sell your surplus used fat to your meat dealer.

These tricks take little time, and are insurance against loss of food, and food is money these days.

Whee! It's corn-on-the-cob time again! Our family is so fond of it we make a complete meal of it! We have a huge helping of green salad, black bread and tons of butter all ready on the table because we like our corn cooked JUST SO! Then we pop just one ear for each of us into a kettle of boiling water and time them exactly 6 minutes. While we are eating the freshly cooked ears, we have another round cooking, and so we have fresh cooked ears every time! We cover the ears with butter, salt them and dig in. What matter if they drip. We keep plenty of paper napkins close by. There's no substitute for a paper napkin at a time like this!

But our great love for summer is hot dogs. Some folks like them with "the works" . . . ketchup, pickles, mustard and just about everything they can think of. Our favorite is Welch rarebit sauce with a goodly dash of Worcestershire sauce to give it zest. We fry our "dogs" in bacon drippings, then split them open, put them on buns and pour the hot rarebit over it all. Of course it's drooly, but we wrap our buns in a paper napkin and have no trouble eating them.

You've guessed it by now. We're a family that believes in fun and comfort . . . hence the party doings. But we don't make work of it. We keep it simple, and we always use paper napkins because we can use them in profusion, throw them away and not worry about the laundry bill.

Salads Made Easy

Dressings make the salad! If you keep these favorite homemade dressings on hand, and if greens are washed well in advance and crisped in the refrigerator, tempting salads can be made in a jiffy. Even leftovers can be turned into interesting salads that will tempt jaded summer appetites.

Cardinal Dressing

Put into jar ¾ cup Mazola Salad Oil, 6 tablespoons vinegar, 1 teaspoon minced onion, few grains each, paprika and pepper, 1 peeled clove of garlic and ¼ cup catsup. Cover tightly; shake well. Chill several hours. Shake thoroughly before using. Excellent for simple green salads, vegetable and chef's salads.

Old-Fashioned Cooked Dressing
3 tablespoons corn starch
1 tablespoon sugar
2 teaspoons dry mustard
2 teaspoons salt
¾ teaspoon pepper
Few grains Cayenne
½ teaspoon paprika
1½ cups milk
2 egg yolks
¼ cup vinegar
½ cup Mazola Salad Oil

Mix first seven ingredients in a small amount of the milk until smooth. Add remaining milk. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils. Boil 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; gradually add to egg yolks. Return to heat for 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and gradually beat in vinegar with rotary beater. Add Salad Oil; beat until smooth. Cool. Makes 2 cups. Use with potato or fruit salads.

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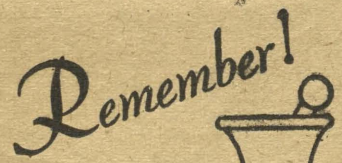
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"New Faces" Star Gives Recipe and Advice to Cooks

Poited Duck

| 1 duck (3 1/2 lbs.) | 2 tsp. tomato paste |
| 1/2 pound chopped salt pork | 2 bay leaves |
| 2 sliced onions | 1 sprig thyme |
| 2 tsp. flour | 1 tsp. salt |
| 2 cups water or giblet stock | 1/4 tsp. pepper |

Prepare duck as for roasting. Fry salt pork slowly in heavy skillet or Dutch oven 2 to 3 minutes; add onions and sauté until slightly browned. Remove pork and onions and sear duck in drippings until well browned on all sides, turning often; then remove duck, stir flour into drippings, add water gradually, and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add remaining ingredients, duck, pork and seasonings, cover and simmer 1 to 1 1/2 hours, or until tender, turning occasionally. Approximate yield: four to six portions.
