

Next regular meeting will be held Monday night, Oct. 11, 7:30 at Masonic hall, 704 North 'A' street.



The FOOD PRIMER

There's nothing much more fun when coming in from school than to find a cookie jar filled to the brim with a new kind of cookie. Cookies taste mighty good with a glass of milk, and together they give extra energy as well as pleasure.

September is a good month for mother to form the habit of making cookies once a week for after-school snacks and lunch boxes.

So, surely, you'll be happy to have this new and different cookie recipe that will bring variety to your cookie jar in the months to come:

Bran Marmalade Cookies
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1 egg, unbeaten
1/2 cup orange marmalade
1 cup raisin bran, or 40% bran flakes

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat well. Then add marmalade. Add flour and mix thoroughly. Add cereal flakes and blend. Drop from teaspoon on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 15 minutes, or until done. Makes about 3 dozen 2 1/2-inch cookies.
