IF SCREWS of bathroom or kitchen accessories won't stay tight in the wall you can give them a firm hold by filling the holes with Plastic Wood. Use a large wooden match stick or blunted pencil to tamp the Plastic Wood into the holes so that they will be tightly packed. Over night, the filler will harden into strong, durable wood that screws can bite into.

It's The Law

The Florida Bar, as a public service, presents this column to inform, not to advise. Facts may change the application of the law.

RIGHT TO REPRESENTATION

Our trial courts are filled with drama. In the newspapers, radio, books, magazines, and TV play up drama, but often play down the pains we take to reach justice in our courts. A court is an interesting place if you know who the parties are and what they do to obtain relief.

The elements in a Court are the judge — he lays down the law; the jury — it settles the facts; the plaintiff and the defendant. The plaintiff in a civil action claims that somebody has violated his rights to his detriment. The defendant denies that he has done any legal harm to the plaintiff.

In a criminal trial the plaintiff is "the state." It is represented by the State Attorney. The defendant is the accused. All criminal actions are entitled, "State of Florida

NATIONAL WILDLIFE

PAINTED REDSTART

The amateur who is interested in early colored warblers is apt to reach the conclusion that the females of this group are less brilliantly colored than the males. Those who know the ordinary redstart may place greater reliance in this because of the marked differences in the coloration of males and females. However, in the case of the Painted Redstart both sexes appear to be identical, and it is no worthy of note that the young birds are colored much like the adults from the time they have the first full plumage.

The birds are colored in striking contrasts of brilliant red on the lower breast, jet black on the head, throat, back, center of the tail and over much of the wings. Patches of clear white appear on angles of the wings, on the borders of the tail and on the belly. It is not likely that anyone knowing these characteristics would fail in the identification of this bird.

The Painted Redstart occurs in only a limited area of the United States along the Mexican border within Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. Since they are primarily residents of Mexico and Central America, the birds seen within our country are living at the northern edge of the range. They are summer residents, occurring for the most part in pine and cedar country at high elevations. In the winter they migrate southward from the breeding ranges within the United States.

It is surprising that a bird as beautiful and as conspicuously colored as this one would tend to be so little even more conspicuous by its actions. One assumes that since it frequently closely associated with beauty and this might account for the show of behavior of the Painted Redstart. Such an assumption, however, would be dangerous and should not be made lightly. But these birds do have a habit of flashing their colors as they go about their work. Some have suggested that this behavior, aside from this is general like that of the Brown Creeper, but no one is his right and would accuse a Brown Creeper of affecting vanity.

The nest is sometimes built on twigs where it is well hidden by overhanging grasses. At other times a nest will be found in a hole as much as 16 inches above ground. It is usually bulky and made of plant materials. As a rule there are 4 eggs. These are creamy white with chestnut or russet markings. Young birds may assume their full juvenile plumage early with juvenile molt sometimes beginning in June and lasting until October.

One of the most remarkable notes on the Painted Redstart stems from the discovery of one of the birds at Marblehead Neck, Massachusetts in mid October 1847. The identification was made by authorities who, in fact, knew the color of birds cannot be questioned. How the bird got so far from its usual range is a question that has "stumped the experts."

The National Wildlife Federation is pleased to give you this description of a bird which is worthy of protection.

LAST ARTICLE ON FEDERAL RESERVE



Men now in service will not be compelled to serve in Reserve units if they enter the service before August 15th. However, they retain a great war military service obligation, a contrast to the six-year obligation that the new law provides. These men who have opted for the Reserve for their entire obligations of their duty to participate in Reserve training.

The new Reserve law includes "incentive" provisions to encourage men now in service to become active Reservists when they are released from active duty. Men now leaving the service before August 15th will be allowed to complete their Ready Reserve obligation by serving satisfactorily for one year.

At the conclusion of the year they will go into the Ready Reserve for the remainder of their eight year obligations and become exempt from further service except in case of a declaration of war or emergency provision authorized by Congress. This article has discussed the only provisions of the new Reserve law that the Army intends to use at this time. Authority was written into the law by Congress that permits the service to offer other plans. Information will be forthcoming on these plans at a later date and will be discussed in a series of articles.

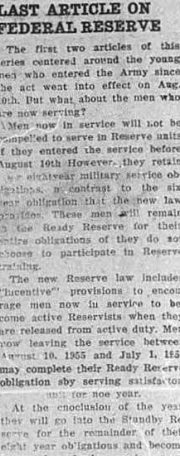

Attending the National Safety Council's October in Chicago is one of the highlights of my "traveling year." During the Congress I have the honor to present the Carol Lane Awards for Traffic Safety to the six top winners in behalf of the National Safety Council. I present the awards to three women and three men who have made significant contributions to traffic safety. It's a thrill to help recognize work done by winners like these:

1. The individual award went to Mrs. P. W. Hodges of Tucson, Arizona, for helping groups throughout the state focus attention on traffic safety. As a result of her efforts, a safety "work-shop" were established, local safety programs quadrupled, and the Arizona Safety Bells were originated.
2. First award in the group classification was won by the Women's Division of the Greater Minneapolis Safety Council. Their "No-Alcohol" traffic award program, for example, has resulted in a concentration on the problem of alcoholism as an outstanding program for high-school students.
3. Mrs. Glen Rabb, principal of the W. J. Wheeler Elementary School, Commerce, Texas, received the second place award for her work because of the extensive traffic safety program she conducted in the school and the community. The Parent-Teacher Council of Provo, Utah, placed second among the groups for its executed "Safety on Streets" bicycle safety program.
4. For organizing the women's groups in Maryland into an effective traffic safety group, Mrs. John S. Gardner, Baltimore, received the third place, individual award. The Black Mountain women's Club, Black Mountain, North Carolina, won third group award for its continuous community-wide traffic safety program.

Metal Fatigue Study At U of Florida

The metal fatigue theories on metal fatigue will be evaluated after intensive tests undertaken at the University of Florida's Engineering and Industrial Experiment Station. A team under the direction of Frank E. Richard, professor of Civil Engineering, now is busy in design fatigue in 1956 work of specimens under a contract with the Air Force Propeller Laboratories of Wright Air Development Center.

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Molasses Plum Pudding For A Feast



Plum pudding matches the festive mood and menu of the holiday season. Though not a simple plum in this traditional dessert, it is a mixture of dried fruits with delicate unspiced molasses to give it the flavor melody.

Children's favorite plum pudding recipes from England, early in the sweet touch of molasses. Unspiced molasses, then as now, suggests mellowness being the natural, concentrated juice of sun-ripened sugar cane.

Plum pudding can be made a day, several days, or a week before use. Remove from mold after steaming, cool and wrap in waxed paper and store in refrigerator. Then re-steam about an hour in the same greatest mold before serving. Fancy molds or covers of various materials may be used as a substitute for the regular steamer or deep, covered kettle with a rack in the bottom. The trick is to keep in the steam which bakes the pudding.

- MOLASSES PLUM PUDDING**
- 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 - 1/2 cup finely cut dried dates
 - 1/2 cup raisins
 - 1/2 cup sliced dried figs
 - 1/2 cup currants
 - 1/2 cup molasses
 - 1/2 cup unspiced molasses
 - 1/2 cup molasses
 - 1/2 cup molasses

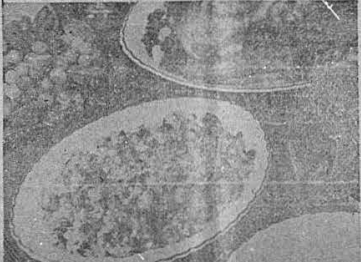
500 together flour, sugar, salt and spices. Stir in nuts and fruit mix well. Combine eggs, unspiced molasses, salt, and shortening. Stir into dry ingredients, mixing well. Turn into a greased and floured deep pudding mold with a high flange cover. Or cover with aluminum foil or two thick layers waxed paper to securely place on rack. Bake in water bath to half the depth of mold. Cover. Steam 3 hours. 45 minutes. Add a few boiling water during steaming if necessary. Serve warm with a hard sauce. In cream sauce, or whipped cream, with a light unspiced molasses sauce. YIELD: 16 to 12 servings.

 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup water or stock
 - 1 to 1 1/2 pound turkey

Melt butter, add onion and cook well until tender, but not brown. Add bread crumbs, Brazil nut, celery, onion, parsley and stock. Cook about 5 minutes over medium heat, stirring constantly. Add water or stock, heat lightly. Stuff turkey wings part of the stuffing. Put remaining stuffing in corner of square of aluminum foil. Fold and press sides tightly together. Roast turkey. Force aluminum-wrapped stuffing in oven during last hour of roasting. YIELD: 10 cups.

How To Prepare And Roast A Turkey



Turkey talk this holiday season will center around the ease of preparing this magnificent bird. In even greater supply this year will be the beautiful meaty quality turkeys which are "tucked" to give a plump, buttered appearance which makes this bird even easier to prepare.

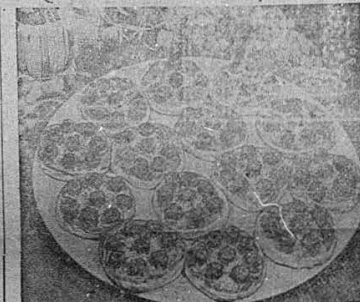
The tucked turkey has a slit low on the breast through which the legs are held when purchased. After purchasing, allow to thaw according to the directions on the clear wrapper, pull the legs out of the tucked band and stuff with 3/4 cup of stuffing per pound of ready-to-cook turkey. After stuffing, slip the legs back into the slit and the turkey is ready for the oven without the difficult and time-consuming trussing operation.

Brush the turkey with melted butter and roast breast side up in a shallow, open pan. Do not cover or do not add water. A light cover of aluminum foil or cheese cloth will prevent the breast and thighs from browning too rapidly.

Roast in a 325° F. oven, according to the following schedule prepared by home economist Martha Logan:

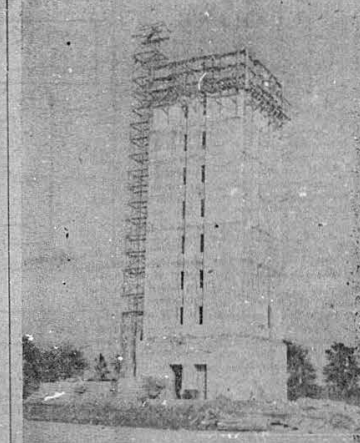

FAMOUS CITRUS TOWER NEARS HALFWAY MARK



Something different from the usual run of tourist attractions is now under construction at Clearwater. NATIONAL WILDLIFE

CHESTNUT SIDED WARBLER

Shrubber, near pastures or at the margins of woodlands provides food, shelter and a proper setting for this delightful warbler. Late froding and early summer are the times when most of us are likely to see and hear this bird. Probably there are more persons who will recognize this bird by sight than there are those who will recognize its call, but it because most amateur naturalists have been trained to use their eyes rather than their ears and because it is easier to print a bird's picture than it is to accurately transcribe its voice.

The Chestnut sided Warbler measures about 5 and a quarter inches in length. This is about the average for warblers that swarm through our tree tops in early summer. The female is slightly smaller than the male. The name justly implies that the most distinctive field character is the chestnut coloration on the sides. In spring, the adults show conspicuous yellow crowns that contrast sharply with the dark crowned Bay breasted Warbler with which this species might possibly be confused. In the fall, the birds appear to be greenish above and whitish below and have a rather distinctive white eye ring and two white wing bars.

During the breeding season Chestnut sided Warblers range from central Saskatchewan to Newfoundland and south to eastern Nebraska, northern New Jersey and the mountains of Tennessee and South Carolina. The winter range includes the area from Guatemala to Panama. Occasionally the birds are found in California, in Greenland, Florida and the Bahamas but these are exceptional cases.

The nests of Chestnut sided Warblers are usually well hidden in the trees and shrubs, and not over a few feet above the ground. They are neat, compact structures made of grasses, weeds and bark, well cemented together with cobwebs and lined with fine plant fibers. In the nest, the hen bird lays four or five white or creamy eggs that bear brown or lavender spots. The eggs are about two thirds of an inch long.

Incubation lasts for ten to eleven days and the young are cared for by both parents. There is but one brood a year.

As might be expected, if one were to judge from where they birds are found, the food consists largely of insects that feed upon the foliage of trees and shrubs. These warblers are known to eat large quantities of gypsy moths, tent caterpillars, browns, tailed moths, plant lice, leaf hoppers and borers. They are entitled to the reputation of being one of our best caterpillar destroyers, but they may also be seen making short dashes into the air to capture insects on the wing. During the nine days the young remain in the nest, they are fed insects almost exclusively. During this period, the parental birds are just too busy to continue being as shy as they seem to be at other times.

The National Wildlife Federation is pleased to call your attention to one of our most useful birds, the Chestnut sided Warbler.

HUNTING AND FISHING

TALLAHASSEE — Six new employees of the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission are now undergoing extended special training prior to being assigned to regional areas as probationary wildlife officers, according to A. D. Aldrich, director. An additional 3 new employees will begin training before November 15.

All new employees must now undergo special training in programs and policies of the Commission as well as the activities of the various departments before being assigned to duty in the field, Aldrich said.

The special training course is being supervised by David E. Swindell, liaison and special training officer for the Commission. The course is designed to acquaint all new employees primarily with Commission policy, law enforcement techniques, fish and game laws and regulations, operation of specialized equipment, radio communications, game and fish management procedures, public relations and other Commission activities.

Purpose of the special training is to provide more efficient public servants, Aldrich stated.

All new employees as well as old employees will also attend the regular Game Commission Employee Training School held during the Spring of each year.

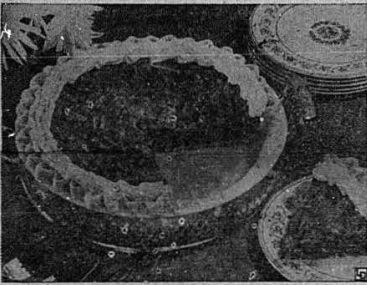

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Oyster-Rice Turkey Stuffing Is Elegant

This Oyster-Rice Stuffing is a "must" for that turkey (or chicken) you're planning to roast. It's easy to make because there's very little chopping to do and no bread crumbs to bother with.

- INGREDIENTS:**
- 1 cup uncooked white rice
 - 2 cups water
 - 2 teaspoons salt
 - 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 1/2 cup chopped onion
 - 1 cup chopped celery
 - 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
 - 3/4 pint oysters
 - 1/2 cup water or turkey broth
- METHOD:** Put the rice, water and salt in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with lid and let it simmer for 14 minutes. Remove from the heat but leave the lid on 10 minutes.
- While the rice is cooking, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and celery. Cover and cook over a medium heat until tender, stir-

ring occasionally. Stir in the black pepper. Add the onion and celery to the rice mixture. Add the oysters and water or broth and mix gently.

This stuffing may be prepared ahead of time so long as the liquid is not mixed with the dry ingredients until the turkey is to be stuffed and cooked. The turkey should be stuffed just before it is placed in the oven. It should not be stuffed and refrigerated. Extra stuffing may be baked in a separate pan or made into dressing balls. Allow 3/4 cup of stuffing for each pound of poultry, dressed weight, or 1 cup for each pound ready-to-cook weight. This recipe makes 4 1/2 cups of stuffing.

How to Bake the Turkey: Remove pin feathers from turkey and singe if necessary. Remove any bits of lung, kidney, etc., remaining in turkey. Wash and rinse inside and outside with cold water. Wipe dry. Rub cavity lightly with salt. Put enough stuffing into the neck of the turkey to fill it out nicely. Fasten the neck skin back with a skewer. Stuff cavity well—

but do not pack stuffing tightly as it expands during roasting.

Shape wings ("akimbo" style) bringing wing tips up to the back. Place skewer across stuffing opening of turkey and lace shut with cord. Tie legs to tail. Grease skin thoroughly with fat. Place the turkey, breast down, on a rack in a shallow pan. If the bird is very large and difficult to turn, place breast up and leave in this position throughout the roasting. Lay fat-moistened cheese cloth over the turkey. Place in pre-heated 325°F. oven. Do not cover with a lid. Do not add any water. As cloth dries out, moisten with fat from the bottom of the pan. Roast until done, following the timetable below. Garnish turkey with frosted grapes made by dipping grapes first in beaten egg white, then in granulated sugar.

POLITICS AND POWER

Sure fire evidence indicating the political nature of the public power issue can be found in the record of efficiency, progress and service chalked up by the privately owned and operated electric companies all across the nation.

A typical midwest company with some 94,970 electric customers, largely in Iowa and Minnesota provides a case in point. There is no power shortage in the area and no talk of one. The company's promotional activities are directed toward creating a greater demand for power. It is a community booster because its growth is dependent on the growth and prosperity of the area it serves.

New construction, which in 1954 amounted to \$4,177,000 has kept the company ahead of every demand. Promotion of farm electrification has been continuous and successful. The average rural customer now uses 4,873 kilowatt-hours per year. The biggest single slice of the 1954 revenue dollar - 22 cents - went to pay taxes for the support of federal state and local government.

This is the story of one modern power company a leader in community affairs and an active promoter of the growth and development and well-being of the area it serves. It is a typical story, which glaringly illuminates the political motives of those who try that taxsubsidized federal power monopolies are the only way to meet the demands of our growing nation. * Interstate Power Company.

NO PLACE FOR COMPULSION

It is easy to understand how the members of a Democratic club for the election of Democratic candidates for a public office, or the members of a Republican club seeking the election of their candidates, might be assessed to raise a fund for political action. It is hard to understand, however, how a labor union can use the funds collected from all its members, who belong to various political parties, to promote a particular party candidate.

What would happen if a corporation assessed its employees or its stockholders to raise a special fund to promote a special candidate? It would be illegal difficulties arise. What is the difference between that and compulsory union assessments for political purposes? If union members or corporation stockholders or employees wish to voluntarily put up their money to help a candidate carry on his campaign, they have the privilege of doing so, but to be compelled to put up their money for a candidate is a different story, whether they favor such candidate or not. Compulsion should be wiped out of the American picture where a man's political beliefs or the right to work are concerned.

HUNTING AND FISHING

TALLAHASSEE - Thousands of Florida hunters will be at their favorite gunning stands one half hour before sunrise Wednesday, on November 23, the day before Thanksgiving as the statewide hunting season on resident game animals according to A. D. Aldrich, director, Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. Hunting will be allowed every day in all districts.

Native animals and birds on the list include deer, turkey, bear, panther, quail, squirrel and rabbit. Migratory birds which may be taken during the statewide season include woodcock, co. c. all birds on game. Nests, eggs, game and birds which may also be taken by hunters include bobcat, raccoon, red and gray fox, skunk, weasel, and a few unprotected birds such as jackdaw, crow and Blue Jay.

Animals and birds which are protected at all times, and cannot be hunted under any circumstances include doe deer, fawn deer, deer with antlers less than five inches in length, the rare spotted or Axis deer, Ross' goose, snow goose, brant, swan, non game and song birds, cub bear, Key deer, and Bluegill Kite.

Hunting will be allowed the first five days, Wednesday through Sunday, November 23 through 27. Thereafter, hunting of deer, turkey, quail, squirrel, bear and panther will be prohibited on Monday, Tuesday and Friday in the First, Second, Fourth and Fifth Districts. Hunting is allowed every day in the Third District of Northwest Florida. The period from December 23 through January 1 will be open to hunting every day in all Districts.

Migratory game birds, season, ducks, coot and woodcock, may be hunted every day in all districts.

Christmas shopping in Pensacola is due to get a shot in the arm during the next couple of weeks with the 1955 payoff of Christmas Savings Clubs. An estimated 148,500 will be added to the pocket books of about 7,600 Christmas Club savers when the checks are delivered by mail. These figures represent savings recorded by the Florida Savings Bank, First Bank and Trust Co. and Mutual Federal Bank & Loan Association.

GUARD YOUR CHILD'S HEALTH

Most parents are careful to safeguard their small children and infants against the hazards of diphtheria, but some are inclined to be less aware of the principal cause of infant and childhood death - accidents.

So says the Florida State Board of Health Division of Health Information.

In children between the ages of one to 15 years, accidents kill and cripple more children than any other cause, states an article in the division's monthly magazine, FLORIDA HEALTH NOTES.

Citing the childhood perils of diphtheria, polio and tetanus, the article states:

All the three diseases named above are dangerous, and children should be protected against them, but day in and day out in Florida more children lose their lives from accidents than from any other cause during 1954.

The State Health Agency's Bureau of Child Protection noted that accidents accounted for the lives of 235 child, a from infancy through four years, while the death toll in the 5-9 age group totaled 144 for a childhood total of 379 deaths during 1954.

Principal locations for fatal childhood accidents included the home, where multiple hazards, such as fire and explosions, poison, firearms, falls and other types of accidents, accounted for 187 fatalities in the first through the fourteenth year; accidents involving motor vehicles, 38 fatalities and accidents occurring in public places including transportation services, 117 deaths.

Pointing out the need for safeguarding children more carefully against accident hazards, the article noted:

The problem of accident prevention in childhood is unique. No endowed foundation, no research laboratory and no inspired investigator is going to develop a vaccine serum, antibiotic endocrine extract or operation that will prevent accidents.

Though interest, thought and statistical research can be stimulated at the community level, the ultimate mediators of any accident prevention program are the parents.
